

## MUSTANG OF THE MONTH

Due to the Mustang's initial release when I was in my mid-teens, I was aware of the exciting new car, but had no contact other than through car magazines. My first actual experience with one was a couple of years later. A friend knew someone who had a red 1965 or 1966 fastback, a 289 4-speed. Somehow, he managed to borrow it for a couple of hours and we spent some time enjoying it on the backroads of Montana. Compared with the mundane beaters we owned at that time, it was like being handed the keys to some exotic foreign car.


My first Mustang was ordered new in 1977. Don't snicker, it was a white Mustang II Cobra II with red graphics and a red interior. By today's standards the 139 HP 302 and 4-speed is pretty anemic, but it was state of the art for those times. In spite of the Mustang II often being maligned as a poor vehicle and not a real Mustang due to the significant downsizing and different styling compared with previous models, it actually was a nice car. It was comfortable, at least in part due to being my first air-conditioned vehicle, drove and handled well, and was a fun vehicle. As a result of multi-vehicle swapping, I ended up with a Triumph TR7, the wedge. While that was a fun vehicle to drive, the less said about its reliability, the better. May Joe Lucas, the Prince of Darkness, rest (un)comfortably in his grave!

Many years ago I bought a 1966 Mustang coupe project and began accumulating parts. For many years my wife, Sharon, said I had two Mustangs, the one in the driveway and the one in boxes in the shed. After accumulating another parts car, I found a third coupe which I am still working on today. So far, I've rebuilt the suspension, brakes and seats and added rack-and-pinion steering. Last year it got back on wheels for the first time in 10 years, but still has a ways to go to become road-worthy.

Due to the price of new trucks, I looked for a Mustang as a daily drive to avoid putting additional miles on my Dodge 4x4. I found a red 1997 Cobra with quite a few modifications. While it was a fun car to drive, it wasn't the most comfortable and needed some body work. Luckily, someone bought that one and my two 1966 parts cars. A few years ago, a neighbor had a Legend Lime 2006 GT Coupe which I bought and modified. Lowering springs, Koni shocks and struts, brakes, wheels and tires, Hurst shifter, Borla mufflers, a Roush cold-air intake, and updated lights increased the drivability factor. With Sharon's Jeep nearly being paid off, she said "When it is paid off, why don't you get the Mustang you really want?" Of course, that sent me off on frequent internet searches for Mustangs, particularly GT350s. Unknown to Sharon, this week I found a 2016 Competition Orange 2016 Saleen White Label Mustang with 22,000 miles on it at a local dealership. One quick car swap later, I'm now the proud owner of that Mustang, and Sharon has gotten over her shock and loves it too! I'm looking forward to enjoying it at RMCC events and will see you on the road!

- 1. **D–All of the above**; these were just a few of the prototypes that inspired the pony car.
- 2. C-1964; Ford began commercial production in March 1964, a full five months ahead of normal car manufacturing cycles-which is why those early production models are often referred to as 1964<sup>1/2</sup> models.
- 3. **D–False**; First Generation Mustangs were only available in North America. In fact, global distribution didn't occur until the release of its Sixth Generation model in 2015.
- 4. **B-False**; Ford only initially offered convertibles and hardtops (or notchbacks). The GT was a performance package rolled out for the first anniversary of the Mustang.
- 5. **A–A knight on a chessboard**; the left-facing running horse has had very few changes since its conception. Colors and other elements, including stripes, have been added and removed over the years, but the pony remains steadfast.
- 6. **D**-17; although Ford produced the 1964<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> Mustang in 18 colors, their Pace Car White was only available to dealers and other special giveaways connected to the Indy 500 that year.
- 7. B-Wimbledon White; this was the most popular Mustang exterior color produced in both the 19641/2 and the 1965 models, followed closely by the Rangoon Red. By 1966, Mustang's Candyapple Red surpassed the favorite white's production numbers.
- 8. **C–1963<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> Falcon Sprint**; a compact two-door (available in hardtop or convertible) with bucket seats and many of the same options as the Falcon, including a 260 cubic inch V8 engine that Mustang used in its 1964<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> muscle car.


